Tropical Mission: Dental Outreach in Jamaica

For the past 8 years, a group of dental students and faculty have gone on a week-long outreach trip to various communities in Jamaica to provide dental care. This year, unlike previous years, a large collaborative effort was put forth into fund-raising. We organized the first talent show at the UMSOD consisting of dental faculty and students sharing their talents. Performances included ballroom and hip-hop dancing as well as classical music and a full band. The talent show was a great success that received positive feedback from all those in attendance and we hope it will become an annual fundraiser at the school.

Every year, the mission trip is scheduled in January in honor of Martin Luther King Jr.'s legacy. The ultimate goal this year was to provide dental care to underserved communities in the surrounding areas of Runaway Bay, Jamaica. Students and faculty of the UMSOD partnered with founding members of Healthcare International Inc. and other dental students and professionals to serve in the rural areas in most need of medical and dental care.

We were lucky enough to stay in a great location in the beautiful country and have some time to relax and try different activities. However, volunteering in Jamaica was hard work that required a consistent daily routine. At the start of the day, everyone met for breakfast to have a good meal before work began at 7:30 am. After breakfast, everyone helped to load the vans to transport equipment and supplies. Once we arrived at the site, the equipment and supplies were unloaded and set up to make our day as productive and efficient as possible. We visited a different primary school each day and were able to see both adults and children. Most of our work consisted of extractions and prophies and small sedative fillings. After a full eight to nine hour workday, we traveled a couple of hours back to the resort to relax and reflect on our accomplishments for the day.

The Taj Mahal was the site Dr. Temple enjoyed the most. Its exquisite design and craftsmanship, white marble inlaid with semi-precious stones, is aweinspiring. And the story that goes along with it is sad and amazing. The Taj was built by Shah Jahan in memory of his third wife, Mumtaz Mahal, who died during the birth of their 14th child. Building started in 1632 and was completed in 1648, but it took 5 more years to finish the surrounding buildings and garden. In his later years, Shah Jahan was "imprisoned" by his son, and never set foot in the Taj; he could only watch its final construction from his apartment in the Agra Fort downriver from the Taj. He was then buried in the Taj Mahal next to his wife Mumtaz.

Martin Luther King Jr. Celebration

On Monday, January 21st 2013, the Multicultural Affairs Committee of the University of Michigan - School of Dentistry hosted an awards ceremony that celebrated the 50th anniversary of the Martin Luther King Jr.'s "Dream Speech," as well as the great achievements of the winner's of the Ida Gray Awards. The ceremony began with the uplifting words of the African American National Anthem "Lift Every Voice and Sing," echoing from the audience throughout the Sindecuse Atrium of the dental school.

Following the anthem, Dean Peter Polverini gave a speech expressing the successes and challenges of the dental school with facing equity and diversity in the past, present, and future. He celebrated the considerable advancements that the Michigan School of Dentistry has made over to become an inclusive environment that celebrates diversity.



After watching an inspirational video presentation of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s "Dream Speech" from August 28th 1963, Dr. Bonita Neighbors discussed the importance of continuing Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s message of social justice in the field of dentistry today. Dr. Neighbors elaborated on the need for future dentists to work to fix the health disparities involving minorities in the field of dentistry.



Dr. Bill Piskorowski celebrated the collaboration of dental students, faculty, and staff of all different ethnicities and backgrounds striving to fulfill one mission: to advance oral health care. Dr. Piskorowski expressed the need to focus on positive achievements of the university's students, faculty, and staff in order to obtain inspiration for future advancements.



Dr. Marilyn Woolfolk concluded the MLK discussion by having students of the audience stand to represent the diverse community and social equality the school has to offer. She continued to discuss how it has come a long way from just an all white male dental class to one filled with people of all gender, ethnicity, and economic backgrounds.

Dr. Woolfolk stressed how Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr exemplified great persistence and how that persistence should be valued today to further achieve social equality. Together, the doctors were able to celebrate the meaning of justice and equality to celebrate the 50 years of social advancement led by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

After a musical interlude of the song "Lean On Me," played by pianist and D3 Student Peter Van Beck, the ceremony concluded with the introduction of the recipients of the Ida Gray Awards. Ida Gray is recognized as the first black woman to graduate from the UM school of Dentistry, as well as the first black woman to earn a D.D.S. degree and to practice in Chicago. Juana Gissendanner, BS, RDH from POM received The Faculty Award. Elizabeth Easter from MCOHR received the Staff Award. The Wolverine Patriot Project

What is the Wolverine Patriot Project (WPP)? It is something more than just providing dental treatment to military veterans. It is the beginning of a process of putting military veterans that are below the 200% poverty level back into society so that they can succeed. The WPP has been fortunate enough to have the help of Dr's Edward and Janis Duski, a husband and wife team, and their staff at Duski Dentistry in Gaylord, MI, open up their doors to these welldeserved military veterans.



The WPP, under the direction of Dr. Wilhelm Piskorowski and Dr. Hamerink, Howard consists of: Ameen Shahnam, Kevin Goles, Tony Guinn, Mariam Dinkha, and Jesse Edwards III. Each member has his or her own personal reasons for taking part in this project. However, they all have the common goal of providing care to military veterans. The mission of the program is to enhance student education while also providing care to disabled and homeless military veterans, which serves as the primary focus of the program. In fact, there is no dental program that focuses on veterans that have given a lot to this

country, especially those veterans that have often been forgotten. Not only are we providing care to these veterans, but WPP also wants to complete these patients' treatments from start to finish.



In total, we have provided over \$26,000 worth of treatment to approximately 27 veterans. WPP will next be traveling up to Duski Dentistry for the third time on March 22nd and 23rd to provide care to these veterans, who were present at the previous two events. This third event is going to be vital to the continuation of this project as, afterword, all the data from the three events will be compiled and presented to stakeholders of this project. Thus, it will be determined if this project will be sustainable to be considered part of the University of Michigan Community-Based Dental Education Program with the help of Champions in the community of Gaylord, MI.
