Meet the Dental School Class of 2016



For the second time in our school's history, the D1 students started their first term before the July 4th weekend. A total of 108 students out of the 2,168 enrolled and arrived on June 25, 2012, for the welcome breakfast. Sixty-five of the students are Michigan residents and 43 students are non-residents who came from all over the U.S. and Canada. Their educational experiences range from a Ph.D., Masters and Bachelor's degrees to students with three or more years of college.



On their second day on campus, they participated in a workshop entitled "Building community in times of diversity" and then travelled to the Farmington Hill Holocaust memorial in the afternoon. On the bus to the memorial, they received a short survey that asked them to answer some questions about themselves such as why they want to become dentists, which hobbies and travel experiences they have, and anything else that might be interesting about them. Eighty-six of the students responded and the diversity of the answers shows how interesting our new D1s are. Twenty have a spouse or partner, and 3 have children with one additional baby on the way. Nineteen D1s have close relatives who are dentists or dental hygienists such as their father (7 students), uncle/aunt (8), mother (3), grandfather or grandmother (3), cousin (4) or brother (1).



Why dentistry?



While having one or more family members who are dentists or dental hygienists inspired some of our students to come to the dental school, the D1s also offered a variety of other reasons why they chose this profession. In fact, many wanted to become dentists before they even went to college. The most commonly named reason for choosing dentistry had to do with the fact that dentists can help others and serve their communities, with 35 students mentioning this reason. Many of the other answers were related to



aspects of the profession as students looked forward to working with their own hands, being their own bosses, and having relationships with patients. Some entered dental school because they are interested in healthcare or had positive experiences when shadowing their dentists. In addition, a few students were excited about the possibility to use their artistic abilities in their work. Overall, the class has been drawn by past experiences and a want for the profession's work structure and opportunity.



Free Time Fun

In order to get to know our new D1s a little better, we asked them what they like to do in their free time. When not in the library, the class seems to be very active. The majority of students reported to be active in at least one sport, including a wide variety from basketball and golf to kayaking and snowboarding. Many also mentioned exercising, whether it be working out in general or engaging in yoga and even triathlons. Many D1s expressed an enjoyment for being outside. The new class has also many movie lovers, readers and even has a few musicians and a photographer. Although a myriad of answers involved spending time with family and hanging out with friends, there was also an assortment of unique answers, such as spending time with carpentry and construction projects, visiting brewers, gardening, sewing, and babysitting. We hope that our D1s will not stop with these activities - but will try to balance their work in dental school with the fun activities they like to do for relaxation.






Travel Time



Finally, we asked the D1s about their favorite travel experiences. The answers showed that our D1s covered a large part of the world during their travels. Not only did they go to many famous destinations across the United States, but they also visited many countries in Europe (England, France, Germany, Greece, Ireland, Italy, Spain, Sweden) and around the world (Australia, The Bahamas, Brazil, Canada, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Haiti, Israel, Jamaica, Japan, Peru, Poland, South Africa, South Korea, Thailand). Most of the trips were with family and friends and some students had even travelled for dental community outreach trips. Overall, there was quite some enthusiasm for having made these trips and they are sure to stay forever memorable.

Interesting Tidbits



The last question we asked was about one interesting fact about their lives. The answers to this question were amazing and made us look through the class photos, contemplating who might have given some of these answers. Many answers were related to past experiences or hobbies, such as skydiving endeavors or training for marathons. Other

students reported amazing talents and abilities, from belly dancing and the ability to speak Russian, to a D1 who claimed to “make the best instant ramen EVER.” Past careers and aspirations, including engineering and construction, were listed as well as interesting comments on students’ own bodies, such as having small ears and grey hair. While one student is expecting a first child in July, another is nine months in to renovating an 1860’s Victorian Farm House. Some answers focused on food preferences such as “love vanilla, don’t care for chocolate,” but other answers proved to be quite serious, as one student was mis-diagnosed with cancer and told to have only six months to live. The answers show a dental class that is both interesting and diverse and makes us look forward to getting to know them better.

Meet the Dental Hygiene Class of 2015



Starting New

During an orientation session in August, 23 incoming dental hygiene students filled out a short survey as a way to share with us a little bit about themselves. Their answers on this survey also are helping us to introduce these new dental hygiene students to the rest of the University of Michigan - School of Dentistry. Concerning their background, it might be interesting to know that this year we have three male dental hygiene students and 20 female students. Of the 20 students who responded to the survey, 4 reported to have a spouse or partner and two that they have children. Seven of the students have a family member who is a dentist or a dental hygienist.



Why dental hygiene?

While there was a large range of ages at which the class decided they wanted to become dental hygienists, many of them made the choice for very similar reasons. The majority of responses to the question of why choose a career in dental hygiene revolved around a love for both the field of dental hygiene as well as wanting to help others and the community. Some liked the possibilities the field has, stating that it is has great "opportunity for advancement," and welcomed the prospect of becoming a dentist in the future. Others were excited for the continual benefits a career in dental hygiene had to offer, such as a stable job and, in many cases, the ability to interact with others and build relationships on a daily basis. What was noted as most



appealing, however, was the prospect of improving the health of others through education about proper hygiene as well as helping patients have a better, more confident smile. These desires were inspired for some by past employment in the field or simply a lifetime love of teeth and experiences going to the dentist.

What do our new dental hygiene students like to do in their free time?

With school being very rigorous, it is important for students to find ways to relieve their stress. So we asked these students what they like to do in their free time. Many answered that they like to partake in physical activity in a variety of ways. While some enjoy running, swimming, biking, and exercising at the gym, others play sports to stay active. Among the incoming dental hygienists are a number of tennis players in addition to students who mentioned being fans of football and volleyball. There were also numerous responses related to more relaxed leisure activities such as sleeping. Many students also enjoy reading, watching television (including one Law and Order fan), seeing a good movie, or just being outside and boating. A few students also showed their passion for playing an instrument as well as many other hobbies, such as arts and crafts. Many students told us that they love to spend time with family or friends and, in a few cases, with their dogs. We hope the dental hygiene students will find a way to balance these activities with the workload in their program.

Travel Time

The next question we asked the incoming dental hygienists was about their best travel experiences. The responses show that our new dental hygiene class has students who travelled to many places around the world. Some students travelled to Europe and esp. to Italy. Several others traveled even farther east, visiting countries such as Kuwait, Dubai, Jordan, and China. The Middle-East was not the only hot climate the class has visited as some have gone on more tropical vacations to areas such as the Bahamas, Jamaica, Punta Cana, Hawaii, and Miami Beach. In addition, many others reported about great trips around the U.S. such as to South Carolina, Kentucky, Colorado, Alaska, and the northern side of Michigan. The reasons behind the trips were equally diverse. While many went on family vacations or with friends, others used the trip for a specific cause, such as travelling to Honduras to help with dental work for a volunteer organization.

Interesting Tidbits

Finally, we asked for interesting facts about our incoming dental hygiene students. The responses include many hobbies that some of the students have, such as boating, cooking, playing volleyball, and singing in a Romanian choir at church, as well as many past experiences, including traveling to Egypt. Some of the students proudly talked about their pets, as one has a Yorkie at home while another has three cats and four dogs. One classmate stated a love for sea turtles.

Dental hygiene seems like the perfect profession for our students because several students told us that they love to help people. Some students reported about having had previous professions, including an elementary school music teacher and a certified professional skating coach who skated professionally for thirteen years.

Quirky eating habits were shown through an allergy to blackberries and one student's continual attempt to only eat organic food. In addition to interesting facts such as being 100% Polish and having a one year old brother, one student is a former refugee to America as a result of the Bosnian War. The answers provided by the incoming dental hygienist class clearly show how diverse the students are. We want to welcome all of you and hope you share your talents and experiences with all of us during your next 3 years here in our school.

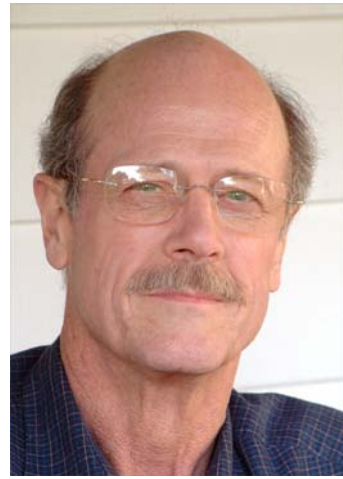
Meet Some of Our Newly Appointed Faculty Members

Since the beginning of the new academic year, we had several new faculty members join our University's Dental School.

Three faculty members who were willing to share some information with us are Dr. Eric Appleberry, Department of Periodontics and Oral Medicine, Dr. Stephanie Munz, Assistant Program Director in Hospital Dentistry, and Dr. Daniela Garcia. Dr. Appleberry grew up in Ohio and attended Ohio State University School of Dentistry, where he graduated in 1968.
