Meet The Dental School Class of 2019

As we welcomed the dental school class of 2019 during orientation in July 2015, we surveyed the students in order to explore the diverse interests, experiences, and backgrounds of the new dental class. We asked them about their families, their relatives working in healthcare, how they spend their free time, the reasons they decided to pursue dentistry, their best travel experiences and interesting information about themselves. Eighty out of the one hundred and nine students responded to our short survey.

Family

Eight of the 80 students are married or have partners and three have children. One of the students has one child; another has two and one student has three children. Forty students reported having a family member working in the dental profession or other healthcare field. Twenty students have one of their parents who is either in the dental profession or other healthcare field. Others have their grandparent, uncle, aunt, brother, sister or cousins associated with the healthcare field. Nine students have dentists in their family, one has a periodontist in the family and four students have a dental hygienist family member. One student mentioned being a dental hygienist and an alum of the University of Michigan dental hygiene program. Other healthcare fields mentioned by the students are doctor, nurse, pharmacist, chiropractor, and radiology scheduler.

Choosing the Field

Sixty students of the new dental school class had decided to pursue dentistry as their career by the age of 18, indicating that they had made their decision by the end of high school. The range of the age varies greatly, one person decided at a very young age of two and another decided at age twenty seven.

Wide ranging responses were received when asked about what attracted them to the field of dentistry, Forty seven students responded that they wanted to help people and serve the community. Several students want to make a difference in underserved communities. Eighteen mentioned they liked interacting and working with people. One of the students' reported "The ability to instantaneously heal someone is what got me intrigued about dentistry" and another student wrote "I wanted to be involved in a profession that has skills which can be used to better people's lives and health." Several students mentioned how a dentist could build relationships with patients and help them restore their smile and making them more confident. Some students want to help people by making dental care affordable and alleviating the access to care issue.

Twenty four students like the hands-on work required in dentistry. Eleven students chose dentistry because of their interest in healthcare. Seventeen students liked dentistry because of the lifestyle it offers which includes autonomy, socializing and good work/life balance. Seven students like the entrepreneurship opportunity dentistry has to offer. Some simply were interested in oral health sciences and others wanted to be associated with esthetics. An interest in research and teaching also motivated some students to choose this profession.

Seven students were inspired by personal experiences with either receiving dental treatment or being a part of a dental team delivering treatment. For example, one student was born without two teeth and wrote "I dealt with it my whole life which led



me to an interest in dentistry." Another student whose dentist helped him with his self-esteem stated that "I want to help patients improve their self-esteem like my dentist did for me." One of them worked as a dental assistant which inspired him to pursue dentistry and another was a part of internship program in a dental office. A student with past experiences with dentistry wrote "Prior experience in dentistry lead me to love all the great qualities of dentistry including providing for patients while working with my hands".

A lot of students wrote that they chose dentistry because it is a combination of various disciplines such as science, art, service and business. For example, one student said "It is a dynamic career that incorporates science, art and business. It also allows me the privilege to help people and form relationships with my patients." Another student described dentistry as "A scientific field that delivers a service". For one of the students, the continued challenges and technology advances in dentistry promise to be a source of enthusiasm for dentistry.

Free Time Activities

When asked about their free time, 75 students mentioned some sort of sports, physical activities or exercise which included playing basketball, tennis, golf, Lacrosse, ping-pong, archery, lifting weights, running, swimming, workout, yoga, figure skating and even dancing. These activities might be one starting point for the new students to bond and socialize with each other as well as with the dental school community. In addition, 28 mentioned that they liked outdoor activities such as to hike, snowboard, ski, fishing, boating, sailing, kayaking, camping, mountain biking, rock climbing and scuba dive.

Seven students like to play an instrument during their free time like guitar, piano and violin. We hope that they will contribute their talent to the Fall talent show. Several students draw, paint, craft and also work with ceramics. Some like to cook, bake, and work in the garden. Others like to read, play video games, build computers and watch T.V./Movies.

Many students like to spend time with their family and friends by going out to a concert, to a theatre, shopping, exploring new restaurants or simply hanging out. Some of students like to travel to different places.

Travel

The new D1s seems to be a very well-travelled group according to the responses we got to this question. Twenty seven students have mentioned travel experience here in the U.S. They travelled to places like New York, Montana, Colorado, Utah, Wyoming, Florida, California, Michigan, Minnesota, Alaska, Boston and Washington D.C. and saw wonderful sights such as

One student wrote "It reinforced my desire to help others" and another student reported "Helping people is an amazing experience, especially in an area that was severely underserved".

One student was the Captain of the University of Michigan track team for two years, another was a volunteer coach of the MSU women's varsity tennis team, and one qualified for 4 consecutive ski national championships. Two students are certified scuba divers. One of the students responded that he jumped out of a plane at 15,000 feet in the air in Dubai.



Seven students wrote about their special interest in music such as playing guitar, clarinet and piano. One mentioned that he is learning ukulele and another is a Dance minor. Other interesting talents of our new D1s are photography, watchmaking, collecting and restoring old radios, designing and styling clothes, and making the best guacamole ever. One of the students has rebuilt a 1990 Chevrolet Camaro.

Some other interesting facts mentioned are being able to wiggle one's ears, having been bitten by a rattle snake, being afraid of bees, hating roller coasters, and having been married by "Elvis" in Las Vegas. One of the students mentioned having broken his front tooth six times. Some students talked about speaking several languages and having travelled to different countries. For example, one student travelled to 43 countries up to now and another went to high school in the United Arab Emirates.














Choosing Dental Hygiene

Almost all students decided to pursue a dental hygiene degree by age 22. There is one student who already knew that dental hygiene would be her career when she was only 8 years old. In response to the question, why they choose dental hygiene as their career, 8 did so because they want to help and work with people. For example, one student wrote that she chose dental hygiene "to help people feel more confident about their smile" and another stated "to help people cope with their fear of going to the dentist". Six students were inspired by their experiences shadowing and working as assistants with dentists or dental hygienists. One of them stated "I shadowed a few dentists and fell in love with the atmosphere and the field." Two of them got interested in becoming dental hygienists while they themselves received dental treatment. Two students took a class or program in high school which motivated them to pursue a dental hygiene career. Six students described that they like the "hands-on" aspect of dental hygiene, three were interested to become a part of a health care team that promotes health and wellness, and one student mentioned that she likes the dynamic nature of the profession, stating that "there is always something new to learn about".

Free Time Activities

During their free time, almost all new dental hygiene students enjoy being active either by playing sports like golf, tennis, volleyball or being involved with outdoor activities like walking, running, biking, snowboarding, kayaking, fishing, riding, swimming or even working out and dancing. These joint interests could be a wonderful opportunity to make friends with each other and the rest of our dental school community. Many of them also like to spend time with their family and friends such as going out to concerts or watching a Tigers' game. Some of them like to read, draw/paint, listen to music, cook, photography, watch television or travel.

Travel Experiences

When we asked the new dental hygiene students which favorite travel experiences they had, we found out that many DH2s have enjoyed travelling with their family and friends across many states in the U.S, from California to New York and from Michigan to Florida. Highpoints were travelling to Niagara Falls or Mackinac Island, Las Vegas, or visiting Nashville because of the love of music. Several students enjoyed these trips with their families or friends. One student described having a great time at her grandparents' 60th anniversary that was celebrated with going on an Alaskan cruise. Another student's favorite place has been Mackinac Island for the past 20 years. Three students had visited countries in Europe such as Germany, Ukraine and Belgium. They wrote that the chance to experience new cultures and languages made

these trips memorable for them. Five had life changing experiences on mission trips to Vietnam, Philippines, Cambodia, Haiti, Punta Cana and Peru. One of the students stated "Mission Trip to Guatemala: Firsthand experience in helping those in need; it was very humbling and such a wonderful experience. It was very amazing to be immersed into a completely different lifestyle and culture." Another student went to Punta Cana which made this person more aware and thankful as expressed in the following statement: "I learned that a toothbrush and running water are hard to come by in these areas. In America we tend to take advantage of the small things".

Six of the students enjoyed travelling to various islands like Puerto Rico, Bahamas, Aruba and Punta Cana with family and friends. Learning about a new culture and seeing amazing views made these trips memorable. One student went on a cruise to 3 different islands and experienced zip-lining and another student travelled to the Middle East to visit family.
