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## Meet The Dental School Class of 2020

During the July Orientation for our new dental students of the class of 2020, we asked these new D1s to answer a few questions concerning their background, whether they have any relatives working in healthcare professions, how they spend their free time, why they decided to pursue dentistry, which best travel experiences they had, and about interesting facts about themselves. A total of 97 of the 109 D1s volunteered some answers and so we can tell you a little bit about our newest dental student class.

#### Entering students' backgrounds

Sixty-two of the entering D1s are from Michigan and 47 from out-of-state, with some students even from Canada and South Korea. This year, 59% of the students are male and 41% are female. The youngest D1 is only 20 years old and the oldest is 42 years. Thirteen students reported having a spouse or partner, and one student even has two children. 37 students have a family member who is either a dentist, dental hygienist, or works in another health profession. Of the entire class, 9 mothers and 11 fathers were reported to have been a dental or health professional! Grandparents, brothers, sisters, aunts, and uncles were reported as well.

#### Choosing dentistry as their future profession

Deciding to pursue dentistry is a major life decision. One student had decided by age 3 to become a dentist! Overall, 51students decided by the end of high school, at the age of 18, to pursue a dental degree; 34 students decided during their undergraduate years between the ages of 19 and 22 years to go into dentistry and only 8 students were older than 22 when they decided that dentistry was for them.

When we asked why the students wanted to become dentists, the answers ranged widely. Many of their answers were related to wanting to work with or help patients. A total of 27 students wrote that they like to have a profession that allows them to help others. Some students were more specific and told us that they want to "help people smile," "help improve selfesteem and self-confidence," or "help underserved and underprivileged patients." A dentist's involvement with the community and being a part of healthcare

was also mentioned multiple times. Eight students like dentistry because of the longstanding bond dentists often have with their patients. Many of them described how they enjoyed teaching and wanted to educate patients about oral health care. Others described that human contact was important for them, and that they love working with others. Dentists' lifestyle was another feature of dentistry that was attractive for many students. They valued the autonomy and the work-life balance that dentists have. The idea of owning a private practice and being independent was a great benefit for some students. One very common response was also that dentistry allows them to use their hand skills. A lot of students liked the combination of art, science, people skills and business management that dentistry offers. Overall, the descriptions of the reasons for entering dental schools showed a lot of enthusiasm for dentistry and excitement to be able to become a dentist.

#### What do our D1s like to do in their free time?

When asked what the D1s like to do in their free time, the absolute majority of the class, namely 75 students, mentioned some type of sports, physical activities or exercise such as playing basketball, soccer, tennis, golf, lifting weights, running, swimming, working out, yoga, and even dancing. In addition, 32 students mentioned that they liked outdoor activities such as hiking, snowboarding, skiing, fishing, boating, sailing, camping, mountain biking, and rock climbing. We hope very much that their busy life as dental students will not keep them from continuing their sports activities and that these activities might even provide them with an opportunity work out and enjoy sports with each other.

About a third of the class also enjoys reading, playing video games, and watching T.V./movies. Only 17 students like to cook or bake – which is unfortunate for the rest of us who might benefit from their hobbies. But several students draw, paint, or do craft projects and a few like to play an instrument during their free time like guitar, piano and violin. We hope that these students will contribute their talent to our dental school talent show.

Many students like to spend time with their family and friends by going out to a concert or theatre performance, to the movies or shopping, exploring new restaurants or simply hanging out. Some students like to travel to different places.

#### Travel

When we asked the D1s to share their favorite travel experience, we were amazed how widely they had travelled. While the students seemed to have travelled all over the U.S. to places like New York, Montana, Wyoming, Florida, California, Michigan, Minnesota, Alaska, Tennessee, and Boston, others reported about wonderful travel experiences outside of the U.S. like the Caribbean. Ouite a number of students had travelled to Europe and some mentioned that they had their best experiences in these places because they got a chance to learn and experience new cultures and languages. The beautiful sights these places had to offer made these trips memorable. Some of the students visited their family in these foreign countries and enjoyed the culture their families are a part of. A few had been to the Middle East visiting Israel and Jordan. Many students had also participated in mission trips to Costa Rica, Honduras, Guatemala, Peru, Guyana, Tanzania, Panama, Dominican Republic and India. Their experiences during these trips were described as unforgettable and as having impressed the students very much. Some students even enjoyed going on visits to dental schools with their friends.

#### Interesting Facts

Our last question was about interesting facts that make the D1s unique and we received many fascinating answers to this question. Many students come from different ethnic backgrounds and some of them mentioned that they know more than one language or love to learn a new language.

Some students wrote about their special interest in music such as playing guitar. One mentioned that he taught himself how to play the electric guitar. Others wrote about sport and their hobbies such as swimming, scuba diving, hunting, skiing, mountain-climbing, playing baseball, golf, basketball, football, soccer, skydiving or snowboarding. Many of the D1s stated that they have been playing these sport for a long time, for an example, one wrote that he played basketball for 10 years, and another student talked about her family's interest in skiing in the Rocky Mountains. One D1 was a girl scout for 11 years.

Students also talked about what they like and don't like. Some students like to cook and bake for special occasions and holidays. One D1 mentioned that he cooks Thanksgiving dinner 4 times each year. In addition, few students wrote what kind of animals they like or used to own such as turtles, snakes, or a Maltese puppy.

Moreover, work and volunteer experience has an important aspect in some students' lives. Some D1s have experiences in farming such as working on a blueberry farm or with livestock care; others worked in different companies and have experience in many fields such as teaching, advertising, and even in dental care. One student mentioned that he volunteered at a nonprofit organization that provided dental care to many recovering drug addicts.

Some other interesting facts mentioned are being able to attach sunglasses to a glasses frame, having done dragon bound in college for three years, or having flown an airplane. One student mentioned that she cuts her own hair and loves to help the community by cutting hair for the homeless and underserved population.














## Getting To Know Our New Dental Hygiene Students





















We are happy to welcome our new class of dental hygiene students. Of the 30 female and two male DH2s who joined us after Labor Day, 30 participated in our "Getting to know you" survey during their August orientation and their responses provide a great opportunity to learn more about them, their families, interests, talents and experiences.

#### Family background

Seven of the new DH2s reported that they have a spouse/partner and two of them have one child each. Eight students have a family member who is a dentist or a dental hygienist. Two students have mothers, uncles, and aunts, one has a sister-in-law and interestingly one had already earned a degree in the dental field.

#### Choosing dental hygiene as their career

One student had decided to become a dental hygienist by the age of 13, and one relatively later in life when she was 28 years old. When asked about their reasons for choosing to be a dental hygienist, each and every one is very positive about their career choice and considers being a dental hygienist as a rewarding profession. Some DH2s like the flexibility that dental hygiene offers in balancing their work and personal life.

Interestingly, two students believe that this career can help them become a good dentist in future. Ten of them chose this career because they want to help their community and like to work with people. For example, four students wrote that they chose dental hygiene "to help people feel more confident about their smile". Three students were inspired by their experiences shadowing and working as assistants with dentists or dental hygienists. Four of them became interested in becoming dental hygienists while they themselves received dental treatment. Two students like the "hands-on" aspect of dental hygiene, three were interested to become a part of a health care team that promotes health and wellness, and one student mentioned that she likes the exciting nature of the profession, stating that "I have a lot of questions about oral hygiene and this is the only field that has always kept my attention".

#### Favorite hobbies and activities

It is great to find out that the new dental hygiene students are very dynamic and like to spend time engaged in various physical activities and sports, like running, kayaking, swimming, biking, bowling, playing golf, snowboarding, Zumba, hiking and camping. Some of them love to read books and spend time with their family and friends. Some of the other activities some DH2s like to do are scrapbooking, crafts, shopping, playing puzzles, cooking, playing with their pets, interior decorating, singing, sewing and also being involved in church activities. We look very much forward to getting to know these new DH2s and learning more about their hobbies in the future.
